AAUW NC 2009 Convention

Be sure to put March 27, 2009 on your calendar! That is the date for the AAUW NC annual convention and WE are the host branch. This will be a centennial celebration of AAUW in North Carolina—100 years of advocacy in education and equity for women!

We'll meet at the Blockade Runner hotel in Wrightsville Beach. As host branch, we make all local arrangements and provide hospitality to our sister branches across the state; about 80-100 are expected to attend, including our members. The hotel has given us a great rate of just \$99 per night, which is applicable to Thursday, Friday, and Saturday night stays and includes the breakfast buffet.



The specific details will be in the next newsletter, but here is a general outline of what is planned. The action begins on Thursday afternoon with a trolley tour of Old Wilmington, followed by an informal dinner at a restaurant in the Wrightsville Beach area. The formal convention takes place on Friday, beginning with a timely presentation on women and finance by our own Barbara Fleming. The luncheon will give all an opportunity to meet AAUW members from across the state and swap ideas. In the afternoon, we'll conduct state business, elect new leaders, and hear from Carol Newman, AAUW regional director. The centennial theme continues with a gala banquet and highlights of the impact AAUW has made in

North Carolina the past 100 years.

Please plan now to attend this special celebration! You can attend just the luncheon and banquet if your schedule does not allow for the entire day, but we hope that you'll participate. Even if you are unable to attend, as the host branch we need your support.
