## Lilly Ledbetter to speak at Women's Advocacy Day, March 1, in Raleigh

Lilly Ledbetter is the keynote speaker at Women's Advocacy Day on at the opening session, Tuesday, March 1, 9-10:30 a.m. It will take place at the Sheraton, 421 S. Salisbury St., Raleigh. She will also speak at the 11:30 a.m. press conference.

Ledbetter was the namesake for the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act which was the first piece of legislation signed by President Obama in 2009.

Her experiences are an excellent illustration of the fact that we indeed do not live in a post-feminist world but also of our collective power when we unite and work toward a common goal.

The lead organization for bringing Ledbetter to Advocacy Day is North Carolina Women United. AAUW NC was supportive of this effort and Nancy Shoemaker, past AAUW NC President, worked with NCWU President Allison Kiser, to confirm Ledbetter's participation.

NCWU will also host a reception featuring Ledbetter the evening before WAD on Monday, Feb. 28.
