Fall workshops offer information, ideas for branches

Fall finance workshop notes

On Saturday, Nov. 1, AAUW NC board members led informational sessions for the attendees at the fall leadership meeting.

Mary Fran Schickedantz, treasurer, explained how to file the IRS 990N (the e-postcard). Branches were advised to file it by Nov. 15 in order to comply with IRS requirements for small nonprofit organizations. Branches with an income of more than \$25,000 or other factors that may complicate their tax status are, of course, encouraged to discuss requirements with a tax professional. If the branch's employee identification number (EIN) has been listed on AAUW's earlier reports to the IRS, this should be a simple process:

- Check the IRS page on the 990N to see the information you need (EIN, contact address, other names, etc.)
- Go to the e-postcard site, epostcard.form990.org, (there's a link on the IRS page) and follow the simple registration process.

If there's a problem with your EIN, do try to get it resolved this year to preserve your branch's nonprofit site. Schickedantz and AAUW NC President Millie Hoffler-Foushee, as well as the AAUW helpline – *connect@aauw.org* – are available to help work through the issues. Branch

presidents and treasurers are especially encouraged to ensure that the branch form is filed correctly. Schickedantz also showed the AAUW Leadership DVD module for the branch finance officers. This video and the accompanying slides are both available at the *www.aauw.org* Member Center: Financial accountability video and Financial accountability powerpoint.

Fall membership workshop notes

Sheila Bassoppo-Moyo, membership vice-president, presented information from two sources at the AAUW NC fall meeting on Nov. 1.

Bassoppo-Moyo shared highlights from the booklet produced by AAUW Fremont (CA), *From Near Disbandment to Success: The Fremont AAUW Story.*

Learn how Fremont, California AAUW devised and implemented a business model to reverse the trend of declining membership. Within two years of applying their model, branch membership increased from 77 to 162.

Bassoppo-Moyo also covered the highlights from the AAUW Membership VP Toolkit, which was sent in late summer to all branch Membeship VPs and includes the 2008 Leadership DVD and accompanying CD of resources. The documents and information are, of course, almost all available at *www.aauw.org*, but if you'd like to see their arrangement as presented to the membership vps, they've been uploaded to the AAUW NC member center. Start at "table of contents" page (login as you would to view the AAUW NC branch state rosters).

Efforts to prevent school violence continue

The problem of bullying in our schools is addressed in the proposed School Violence Prevention Act was considered in the 2007-08 NC Legislative session. A renewed effort is underway to get the bill passed in the next session.

The School Violence Prevention Act would require local school systems to adopt strong, clear policies against bullying and harassment for all students. The bill contains critical language enumerating categories of student characteristics that are often targeted, including physical appearance, race sexual orientation, and gender identity and expression.

Equality NC sponsored two roundtable discussions on bullying and harrassment in NC's schools and how to end it and information on the School Violence Prevention Act in October, in Boone and Wilmington.

Cathryn Sill wins AAUW NC Award for Juvenile Literature

Cathryn Sill received the AAUW NC Award for Juvenile Literature at the North Carolina Literary and Historical Association's 108th Meeting held on Saturday, Nov., in Raleigh.

Sill received the award for her latest book, *About Habitats: Wetlands*. This is a basic text aimed at grades PreK-3. Each page details a characteristic of a type of wetland in simple and succinct

language. Sentences are short and simple for young readers to understand. As children look at the colorful illustrations, they will gain additional knowledge of the habitats by learning words that depict different environments.

Encouraging an appreciation by young children of our environment through Sill's book is very important as we seek to protect our world from the ravages of pollution and other environmental hazards. Besides the succinct text and the beautifully detailed illustrations, an afterword contains a description of the various habitats.



Sill is a former elementary school teacher and the author of the *About...* series. With her husband, John, and brother-in-law, Ben Sill, she co-authored the popular bird-guide parodies, *A Field Guide to Little-Known and Seldom-Seen Birds of North America* and *Beyond Birdwatching*. Husband John is a noted wildlife illustrator for all the *About* books. Other Sill books for young children include *About Marsupials*, *About Birds*, *About Mammals*, and *About Insects*.

Get-Out-The-Vote Projects build momentum in historic election

The afternoon of Sept. 23, AAUW Brevard was asked by the Institute for Women in Leadership (IWIL), a Brevard College campus organization, to assist in a voter registration project. Robin Funsten, the student coordinator, said the project was to begin the next day. We sent a quick e-mail to our membership asking for volunteers to work with the college women. We needed at least one member for a total of 40 time slots over a period 20 days, Sept. 25-Oct. 10.

We missed that first day, but were able to to cover the schedule after that very easily.

AAUW members were struck by the willingness of students to agree to register or to tell us that they were already registered at home and were awaiting absentee ballots. Funsten reported that nearly 50 new registrations were gathered and submitted to the Department of Elections during the first two days.

Because "getting-out-the-vote" was the goal, AAUW Brevard Branch wanted to take things a step farther. We asked Funsten if providing rides to the polls might help. As soon as she got official college permission, we put together a "Shuttle To Vote" schedule. AAUW members were stationed at the Dining Hall for one hour each day of North Carolina's "One Stop" voting days (Oct. 16-Nov. 1). The polls were nearby, but we wanted to make it difficult for students to come up with excuses not to vote. Requests for rides were never more than one or two each day, but we were there making the students aware each day of the opportunity to vote.

Seeing the enthusiasm of these new voters made the entire experience momentous. Having had time to hang out with these "Women of Leadership" was an extra bonus!

AAUW Gains Special Consultative Status with United Nations Council

WASHINGTON – AAUW has gained special consultative status at the United Nations with the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), which initiates reports, makes recommendations, and promotes respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms.

For many years, AAUW has had a U.N. representative attending select meetings and monitoring issues affecting women and girls. The new designation allows AAUW to participate in international conferences, sign on to NGO statements, and share AAUW's expertise.

"We closely follow a variety of international issues ranging from girls' education to women's economic security to human rights to women in peacekeeping," said AAUW Executive Director Linda D. Hallman, CAE. "This new status will strengthen AAUW's presence globally and provide us with greater opportunities to engage in U.N.-related activities and initiatives that break through barriers for women and girls."

AAUW has a proud history in global affairs that includes awarding more than 2,200 international fellowships to women from more than 130 countries and partnering with leading international humanitarian organizations on initiatives to empower women.

Next year, AAUW will actively advocate for women at the 53rd session of the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women, which will focus on the equal sharing of responsibilities between women and men, including caregiving in the context of HIV/AIDS.

"AAUW can now advocate more effectively and support policies aimed at strengthening gender equality, especially in the areas of the economic, social, political, and reproductive health rights of women and girls," said Carolyn Donovan, AAUW's U.N. representative.

Currently, AAUW is encouraging its branches to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights on December 10 and to continue supporting ratification of the women's rights treatythe Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW).

"AAUW members have long supported our efforts, from hosting international visitors to initiating forums and symposia on global issues pertinent to women and girls," said Gloria L. Blackwell, AAUW's director of fellowships, grants, and international programs. "We are thrilled that our role is expanding."
